## Offering: Augsburg Fairview Academy

Augsburg Fairview Academy (AFA) is a public charter school which provides opportunity to complete high school and prepare for college or post-secondary education for students who have not been successful in the public school system and/or seek the positive and supportive learning culture provided by AFA staff. The 140 students are African American, Somali and Native American; many are homeless or marginally housed at least part of the year. Our partnership began when our former staff member, Deb Rodgers, taught a leadership course at AFA and the students created the establishment of the Hope Food and Clothing Closets (supported by First Universalist) as their class projects.

## About Today's Guest Musicians

**Dean Magraw** is a consummate guitarist, playing with wit and soulful abandon. A performer like no other, he is part comedian, part philosopher and all-around musical genius. Transcending genre, he has performed with a cornucopia of collaborators from jazz organist Jack McDuff to folk icon Greg Brown, traditional Irish supergroup Altan to classical violinist Nigel Kennedy.

**Eric Kamau Gravatt** is an American musician, educator and world-renowned drummer and percussionist; the Philadelphia native has played with world-class jazz artists and toured internationally since the 1970s. He started his career in the mid-1960s, recording with artists from that era including Byard Lancaster, Lloyd McNeill, Andrew White, Terumasa Hino, Eddie Henderson, and Joe Henderson.

**Jim Anton** is an award winning bassist, composer, and educator living in the Twin Cities. He can be heard on Jonny's 2006 Grammy Award-winning album *Turnaround*. Jim has shared the stage playing bass with Jackson Browne, David Crosby, Indigo Girls, Paul Westerberg, Greg Brown, Bernard Purdie, Jack McDuff, Lowen and Navarro, Vishwa Mohan Bhatt, Andrew York, and former Tonight Show band leader Doc Severenson.
