Thank you to all those who have generously given as of April 5! Thus far, we have received \$3,684,297 in pledges from fewer than 100 members toward our capital campaign, *Not for Ourselves Alone, Building an Inclusive Future*. We look forward to meeting with all First Universalist members and friends this spring to discuss our vision for the future of our church!

### MN350 PRESENTATION: MN'S NEXT STANDING ROCK?

Please join us today at 1 p.m. in the Cummins Room for a presentation by MN350. Enbridge Energy wants to push through yet another massive crude oil pipeline that would cross protected treaty territory and threaten water supplies across Minnesota. This project, the Line 3 pipeline, would replace a deteriorating existing pipeline, nearly doubling its capacity. The Environmental Justice Team has invited Kathy Hollander and Justin GreyDay of the activist group MN350 to clarify the major issues.

## Offering: Beacon Interfaith Housing Collaborative

Beacon Interfaith Housing Collaborative, through its Families Moving Forward program, provides temporary housing for families experiencing homelessness. Over 60 congregations in the Twin Cities rotate on a weekly basis to create shelter space at their sites, providing a safe place to sleep, meals, and the kindness and compassion of the congregation's volunteers. Up to 16 families are provided shelter at one time through four groupings of up to four families each. Completing the circle of support, Beacon's professional staff works closely with each family to address their unique barriers to stability so they may leave the shelter program for permanent housing. Beacon is one of First Universalist's Faithful Action partners.

## April Worship Theme: Transformation

Karen Armstrong writes: "religion is not about accepting twenty impossible propositions before breakfast, but about doing things that change you. It is a moral aesthetic, an ethical alchemy. If you behave in a certain way, you will be transformed."
