

Walk-in Counseling Center began 45 years ago with virtually the same mission and service philosophy that exists today: free, easily accessible counseling and support to people with urgent needs and few, who have if any, service options or resources.

A Note About Today's Music from Jerrod Wendland:

For today's service, which explores figures from the history of Unitarian Universalism, I've chosen music by two composers who were converts to Unitarianism: Edvard Grieg and Béla Bártok. Both composers are known primarily for their profound study of folk music (from Norway and Hungary, respectively), which made me wonder whether there isn't some connection between these studies and their choice of a humanist faith. I think the answer is that, in the absence of a clear answer to life's struggles provided by tradition or authority, one must open up other avenues of investigation: learning through art, learning through nature, and learning through other people and their music. So, by using folk music as a basis for composition, Bartok and Grieg were not simply adding "local color" or reinforcing an incipient patriotism; rather, they are expressing the belief that the answers to life's questions are best sought from our fellow human beings.

Worship Theme: Arc of Change

In his poem, "The Layers," Stanley Kunitz looks back on his life of changes, "the milestones" and "abandoned campsites" of his journey. All of us leave a trail of hopes that have fallen along the wayside, or burning embers of insight that light the way forward in our changing patterns. Change is. That is the nature of things. In a beautiful turn of phrase the poet writes, "a nimbus-clouded voice directed me: "Live in the layers, not on the litter." This month we live in the layers of change, exploring the arcs of our own lives, the arc of this faith community, and the arc of history and change. To paraphrase Kunitz's final line: We are not done with our changes.
