

Iusical Notes from Jerrod Wendland:

boday's service features music from two important composers whose repcations are doubly obscured: first for being African-American, secondly r being women. Florence Price (1887-1953) was born in Arkansas and udied at the New England Conservatory (where she tried to pass as a lexican) before settling in Chicago. While there, she met Margaret Bonds 913-1972), a young pianist and composer who later performed Price's ano Concerto and frequently collaborated with poet Langston Hughes. 1932, they both won prizes in the Rodman Wanamaker Competition, ading to the premiere of Price's Symphony by the Chicago Symphony rchestra. That these works were written in the face of both personal and political obstacles makes the accomplishments of both women even more inpressive.

Vorship Theme: Arc of Change

his poem, "The Layers," Stanley Kunitz looks back on his life of changes, he milestones" and "abandoned campsites" of his journey. All of us leave trail of hopes that have fallen along the wayside, or burning embers of isight that light the way forward in our changing patterns. Change *is*. hat is the nature of things. In a beautiful turn of phrase the poet writes, nimbus-clouded voice directed me: "Live in the layers, not on the litter." his month we live in the layers of change, exploring the arcs of our own ves, the arc of this faith community, and the arc of history and change. To araphrase Kunitz's final line: We are not done with our changes.
