Musical Notes from Dr. Jerrod Wendland

I chose music by Frédéric Chopin [show-PAN] for this service for two reasons: first, because of his complex and subtle understanding of human emotion; and second, because so much of his life was lived in acute illness (the tuberculosis that ended his life at age 39.) His was a life lived "between." Between composition and performance, France and Poland, illness and health. Like his idol, Mozart, Chopin explored the half-shades between joy and sadness, and for this reason, paints a full and compelling picture of life.
