Musical Notes from Jerrod Wendland

Philip Glass (b. 1937) is a composer who has followed a peculiarly American progression: Outcast, Icon, Industry. A prize student at Julliard, he got a Fulbright to Paris, where he discovered two of his three great loves: the music of North India, and Bohemianism. (The third was Schubert.) Returning to the U.S., he founded his own ensemble (of synthesizers, saxophones and sopranos) and his own method for making music: consonant harmonies articulated through rhythmic patterns, metamorphosing at a glacial pace. Barred from the mainstream, his group played in lofts and galleries, while he paid the bills driving cabs. Success came quickly (ca. 1981-1984) and ended both his bohemian lifestyle and the most exciting chapter of his music. If you haven't done so, please watch the film Koyaanisqatsi.

November Worship Theme: Border Crossing

We must become experienced border crossers if we are to thrive as a faith tradition. So writes Unitarian Universalist Association President, Peter Morales. Border crossing or moving beyond our personal, social, and cultural experience of the world and experiencing life from another vantage point is spiritual work.
