The Holiday Giving Team is charged with the bi-annual effort of leading our congregation to live out our principles by investigating opportunities to reduce our consumerism during the holidays and re-direct our financial and emotional energies to changing the imbalances in our culture. This year's recipient is Beacon Interfaith Housing Collaborative, an organization committed to ending homelessness through advocacy, alternative housing, and temporary shelter. Our goal is to raise \$70,000 this holiday season.

#### **About Dick Hensold**

Dick Hensold (B.M., Oberlin Conservatory) is the leading Northumbrian smallpiper in North America, and for the past 20 years has performed and taught in England, Scotland, Japan, Canada, and across the United States. His solo Northumbrian smallpipes CD Big Music for Northumbrian Smallpipes was released in 2007. He has been composer-in-residence at Pilgrim Lutheran Church in St Paul since 2002, providing music for a Celtic contemplative service. As a church musician, Dick uses his instruments to help create sacred space for worship, using his sounds and melodies to help the congregation interpret the service in an intuitive way.

#### **December Worship Theme: Making Room**

So much in our consumer culture screams hurry up, do more, make it work, squeeze it in. We are bombarded with how to do things smarter, faster, more efficiently, especially at this time of year. If the purpose of the religious life is to grow our souls and repair the world, as Unitarian Universalist minister Richard Gilbert once put it, if we are to move into a greater sense of wholeness inside and out, then making room is key. Making room is different than squeezing it in. Making room connotes a sense of slowing down, refocusing our attention and coming into spiritual alignment. It is developing practices and systems that help us calm our tricked out nervous systems, and finding grace and goodness on the other side, when we least expect it.
