Project DIVA empowers girls to make informed decisions as they transition into adulthood by providing them with an intensive 10-month coaching program focused on strengthening their academic, social, emotional, financial, wellness, and career skills. These areas of focusgive a great foundation for girls to self-discover their purposes individually, with like-minded adults ready to nurture them in the right direction. Project DIVA currently serves about 40 mostly African-American girls aged 11-24 in North Minneapolis and runs an outgoing support group for parents of the participants.

Musical Notes from Dr. Jerrod Wendland

Sergei Rachmaninov (1873-1943) suffered from a double exile: first from Russia to the United States (on account of the revolution); and second from the vigorous, headstrong musical style of his youth, which he abandoned after a disastrous performance of his first symphony. He only returned to composition after a long absence, and then as a reactionary rather than a revolutionary. The ironic thing is that these two catastrophies (one internal, the other external), each of which prevented Rachmaninov from pursuing the path he would have liked, instead resulted in the music we know and love today. The E-flat Major *Prelude* evoked, for the composer, the blossoming apple orchards of his youth.

February Worship Theme: Brokenness

"Life will break you. Nobody can protect you from that, and living alone won't either, for solitude will also break you with its yearning. You have to love. You have to feel. It is the reason you are here on earth." - Louise Erdrich.

Brokenness is part and parcel of being human. We are born into families that fall short, or social constructs that privilege one group over another. Brokenness is. When we don't admit brokenness, the truth of our stories, then we don't make room for understanding, the healing balm of confession, and the deep well of compassion. All is available to us, but first we must admit brokenness.
