

Musical Notes from Dr. Jerrod Wendland

Anyone who has seen movies by Stanley Kubrick has heard the music of György Ligeti (1923-2006). A contrarian and outsider, he ended up celebrated and widely imitated for innovative pieces written for an avant-garde he was never comfortable being a member of. His piano cycle, *Musica ricercata*, makes a game and a discipline out of restricting the number of notes he uses in each piece; the first piece uses only two notes, the second piece three, and so on. These studies offer us a model for how to be creative in restrictive circumstances; they also evoke the folk music of Ligeti's homeland, Hungary.

Summer Worship Theme: Telling a New Story

At the intersection of what is holy and what is human is a willingness to change; to shed old habits, old ways of thinking, old frameworks, old skin; to cast off what no longer functions; and dare to do a new thing, to tell a new story. This ability to change is at the heart of creation and creator. In the book of Isaiah, God says: "Forget about what's happened; don't keep going over old history. Be alert, be present. I'm about to do something brand-new. It's bursting out! Don't you see it?" In these summer months we will endeavor to be alert and present, to see and tell the new story emerging from within, among, and beyond.
