Combining a mixture of speculative, commissioned, and liturgical work, he strives to produce furniture that is simple, nuanced, and enduring.

About Today's Musical Guests

Dean Magraw is a consummate guitarist, playing with wit and soulful abandon. A performer like no other, he is part-comedian, part-philosopher and all-around musical genius. Transcending genre, he has performed with a cornucopia of collaborators from jazz organist Jack McDuff to folk icon Greg Brown, traditional Irish supergroup Altan to classical violinist Nigel Kennedy.

Eric Kamau Gravatt is an American musician, educator and world-renowned drummer and percussionist. The Philadelphia native has played with world-class jazz artists and toured internationally since the 1970s. He started his career in the mid-1960s, recording with artists from that era including Byard Lancaster, Lloyd McNeill, Andrew White, Terumasa Hino, Eddie Henderson, and Joe Henderson.

Jim Anton is an award winning bassist, composer and educator living in the Twin Cities. He is currently recording with Chastity Brown and has toured extensively with Jonny Lang. Jim has worked with such Twin City luminaries as Peter Ostroushko, the Jayhawks, and John Gorka.

January Worship Theme: Cloud of Witnesses

"Do you see what this means- surrounded by such a cloud of witnesses, such a community of ancestors that have paved the way, cheering us on? It means we better get on with it. Strip down. Throw off every burden. No extra spiritual fat, that keeps us from moving (Hebrews 12:1)." Ancestors bless and burden us with legacy. They tell us why we are here and why being here right now matters. In this month we explore where we come from, whose are we, and where we find ourselves in the sacred arc of history.
