#### **About Today's Musical Guest**

Born in Chicago, Anthony Afful was raised in southwest Minneapolis where he attended the International Baccalaureate program. He then went to study music and physics at Gustavus Adolphus College and has just earned his Master's of Music Performance from Bowling Green State University. Happy to be in his native land of Minnesota and to share music and general enthusiasm, you may often find him riding his bicycle at all the junctures of the Twin Cities!

#### Musical Notes from Dr. Jerrod Wendland

When I open my *Dictionary of Contemporary Music*, I don't find any information about Madeleine Dring (1923-1977), even though it was published just three years before her death. A prolific composer (as well as actress, illustrator, etc.), she studied with famous English composers like Herbert Howells and Ralph Vaughan Williams, writing dozens of songs and instrumental pieces, as well as for music for theater, dance, and children's cartoons. Her music is often cheerful in character, with an angularity and humor reminiscent of Poulenc. You could easily open the *Dictionary of Contemporary Music* to a random page and find far worse composers than the ones they left out.

#### **October Worship Theme: Outsiders**

The first principle of our Unitarian Universalist faith states that we affirm the inherent worth and dignity of every human being. This connotes a celebration and welcoming of the variety of human expression, all the different ways and contexts that make us who we are. Yet there is a tendency in our human nature to distrust something that is different than ourselves, that is in some way other or deemed an outsider. At the heart of our faithful root system is an other-affirming imperative, to meet and come to know one another as whole and holy, and embrace the outsider. We often fail. Yet when we lean into our other-affirming calling, we resist the false, dominant cultural narrative of segmentation and separation, and find a surplus of wisdom and ways forward that are surprising, challenging, and life-giving.
