

orship Theme: Wrestling with Joy

ose does joy serve? What is its function? Joy has no utilitarian use, is so necessary? Why does life feel so flat without it? In Jack Gilbert's *rief for the Defense*, he states: "We must risk delight. We can do easure, but not delight." Joy lightens the heavy lifting of justice work, culty of simply living. Joy is about experiencing life welling up, of having its way with us even in the midst of sadness. This month we h the meaning of joy, something that serves no practical purpose lutely necessary. We cannot make it come to us, nor can we corral it g. Still we can invite it, become more prone to its appearance. Most takes some wrestling with all the ways and means by which we tell nd one another, that joy is frivolous.
