Two Talks with Peace Activist Paul K. Chappell

First Universalist's Peace Circle welcomes author and peace activist Paul K. Chappell to the Twin Cities this coming weekend. Two free public talks, on Thursday 9/27 and Sunday 9/30 from 7 to 9 p.m. each evening, are can't-miss opportunities for anyone interested in peace, social justice, and hope for progress in these challenging times. Thursday's talk will introduce Chappell's concept of Peace Literacy, a new paradigm for gaining a deep and practical understanding of extremism, trauma, and the nature of human happiness. Sunday's talk relates Peace Literacy to Racial Justice. Growing up a racial outcast in Alabama, Paul has worked through the trauma of racism and mistrust to hold a new vision for Racial Justice, which he'll share at this second talk.

September Worship Theme: Here... Now... Start

In the Buddhist tradition there is a concept called "maitri." Buddhist nun and writer Pema Chödrön calls it the basis of compassion and the seed of joy. Maitri is a sanskrit word meaning an unconditional friendship with oneself. We spend so much of our time wishing we were someplace other than where we are, wishing we were something other than what we are. What if we made a steadfast commitment to be in friendship with where, what, and how we are, right now? When we are not so preoccupied with getting rid of our "bad" traits, or denigrating our ways of being, perhaps we would be able to see our defense mechanisms more clearly, or the ways in which our negative beliefs about ourselves manifest in our lives and the lives of others. Perhaps we would be able to acknowledge with more clarity and compassion our place in frameworks of oppression and life-denying practices individually and communally. Perhaps, we would also see our wisdom, our bravery, our resilience, and our kindness. What if we said: "Here is where we are. Now is what we have. This is how we start."
