n Housing Services' mission is to house, support and advocate ole experiencing homelessness. Simpson Housing Services began nergency overnight shelter in the basement of Simpson United list Church in 1982. Simpson has since become a leading nonprofit ng assistance to people experiencing homelessness. In response to community needs, their programs have grown to include emergency single adult supportive housing, and family supportive housing. In Housing works across the metro area, partnering with landlords relopers to find affordable housing for all families and individuals. At en time, they provide supportive services to 100 individuals and 210 with over 500 children. Simpson Housing Services is one of First alist's six Faithful Action Partners.
